It was first called Domesday by Richard Fitz Neal in his Dialogue of the Exchequer of 1179, the label not otherwise recorded until 1221, again in an official record, though is thought to be a piece of civil service slang amongst English-speaking clerks.

### **Places | Domesday Book**

The Domesday Book. Hixon is listed in the Domesday Book of 1086. In the survey the village has the name Hustedone. and was described as being very small with five households. The village assets included two ploughs, a meadow and 3 acres. The head of the manor was Haywood. In 1066 the lord of the manor was the Bishop of Chester.

The assessors' reckoning of a man's holdings and their values, as recorded in Domesday Book, was dispositive and without appeal. The name "Domesday Book" (Middle English for "Doomsday Book") came into use in the 12th century. As Richard FitzNeal wrote in the Dialogus de Scaccario (circa 1179):

The greater part of St. Rémy's estates were already in its hands by 1086, when Domesday Book, for reasons unknown, included the Lapley and Marston estates under Northamptonshire, although acknowledging that they were in Cuttlestone Hundred, which is part of Staffordshire.

Domesday Book covers all of England except the northern areas. Though invariably called

Domesday Book, in the singular, it in fact consists of two volumes quite different from each other. Volume I (Great Domesday) contains the final summarized record of all the counties surveyed except Essex, Norfolk, and Suffolk.
